### Sensei's Message:

### Looking to the Future of our Dojo:

#### What Is Real Freedom?

As we quickly approach the New Year, once again I am amazed at how time flies, this year went by so very fast, and I begin to think about our Dojo and Aikido for the future. I reflect on the work we have done this year and as everyone can see by our Annual Yearly Review, we were really quite busy. But, it is not a matter to be satisfied with past accomplishments but to look to the future and see what more we can do. We must honestly review our work, correct our mistakes, see where there is need for improvement, look where there might be need for alteration and welcome new ideas and better ways to be more effective in our lives, to realize more the human potential within ourselves. I am forever thinking about better ways to teach you without compromising Aikido and its tradition - I don't want to change anything simply for the sake of change, simply for the sake of trying to impress or entertain you by showing you something exotic or strange.

For over ten years now, I have stayed close to the Dojo, not venturing out as I used to, so I am not familiar with the Aikido world at large - I do know that it has grown beyond my wildest imagination - there seem to be masters and big dojos everywhere you can turn your neck. The growth of Aikido over recent years has truly been remarkable and I believe more than what most people have ever expected.

This gives everyone the luxury and freedom to practice whatever, wherever and with whomever you wish. What more can you ask for!? And actually, that is what everyone is doing nowadays. We call this "freedom." And, above everything else, we cherish our "freedom." In our own training, I believe it is important for each student to realize "real freedom." More often than not, we misunderstand "freedom" for "self-indulgence."

In my very young days, there were only one of two dojos around. They were not so big as the kind of dojos we see today but it was all we had. Because there was no where else to go to practice, somehow we tried to make it the best we could and managed to survive together. Within that context, there were many problems, but, at the same time, as I look back, there were many problems solved as well.

### **Students Coming & Going**

I don't really know about how other instructors handle this problem, if it is a problem at all with them, but, in my case, over the many years of teaching, I have to keep a distance from most students. This has always been a difficult problem. To teach a student means that you must be committed to him, his education and, to some degree, his future. This creates an attachment. Yet the way students are continually coming and going, one is always in for disappointment. Teachers must be committed to the student, yet, to become too attached to the student means that you are eventually hurt when he goes away or disappears from the Dojo. How do you handle this. One teacher told me: "Gee, I've never really cared enough about my students!" Another replied: "I only look at each student as a dollar sign that's why I treat them so well." Still another replied: "I don't really give a damn - that's why I'm so calm." It's hard to develop a hard shell over one's self - I suppose a teacher is fated to commit himself to his students and continually be disappointed when he disappear smuch like a mother feels when her child leaves home for the first time.

### What Is Most Important In Aikido?

Each student must realize his full potential as he helps those around him to grow as well. We are all in the same boat. And although in the reality of life we try to save ourselves first, our hearts must be cultivated with the strength to save others as well. When we put others before ourselves, we are touching the spiritual plane of our existence. This is the message of Aikido.

However, in helping others, we always feel a little short-changed personally. It is always that Con't.

### Looking to the Future con't.

we may feel unfairly treated. We should accept this uneasy feeling of being treated unfairly for the sake of everyone else and understand that this is the way of the world. Yet, we should be enlightened to the fact that although it may seem unfair to us personally at first, ultimately the good-for-everyone is the greatest good for one's self as well. Jesus Christ sacrificed his life in a most painful way on the Cross for everyone in the world, The Buddha became enlightened for everyone in the world. However wonderful and mysterious words we hear about spirituality in books and from great masters, finally, to put others before one's self is the greatest spiritual teaching.

In our Aikido practice, we practice for the partner's benefit first. This seems to be an odd and unreasonable thing to say, yet this is the only way to think if we ourselves are to develop our own Aikido. What does this mean? It means that we are all connected as one body through the karma we share in Aikido. I believe this is what O'Sensei meant when he spoke about the "one family of Man."


You can't simply change the world. It's impossible. I know. I have tried it many timesin my youth! Without competing with others, we must do our best in our own Dojo. To become a good Aikidoist means to become a "good person." When you become a "good person" you have already changed the world in a most profound way.

During Christmas, I hope everyone will think about their blessings and the sacrifices people have made for your own benefit. It is strange that Jesus Christ would die for me, I wasn't even born then and he never saw my face or met me even once! In the coming New Year, we should think of the future and how Aikido will give us strength to do good in the world. The Buddha said, "Become a good person." Easy said, but difficult to achieve. I know. I've tried it many times. The late Osawa Sensei said: "Let's do good Aikido." I think this is the best way to become a "good person." Gassho.





### **Bodhitree Bookstore Book Signing Oct. 27th.**







Appropriately subtitled "Lessons in the Spiritual Life of the Warrior/Martial Artist," this volume contains 42 short philosophical essays, which Furuya Sensei has published over the years in *Martial Arts Training* Magazine. Titles of the essays include "Returning to the Source," "To Be Discouraged Is a Part of Training," "What Does A Black Belt Really Mean?", "Everything Within Emptiness," "The Face of Humility," and "What Makes a True Master?"

Never pedantic or overly scholarly, Furuya Sensei attempts in these essays to interpret Japanese martial culture and tradition for Western readers. We learn in these pages, for example, that a common word for practice, "keiko," means "to reflect on the past" and that, for important reasons, the Kanji for "shodan" contains radicals meaning "cloth" and "knife."







### Barnes & Noble Book Signing Nov. 3rd.










