



Actually, I have very little but even this is something to be truly appreciated. I have come to believe that to appreciate all that life offers is to truly to un-

derstand what life is all about and becomes indeed an appreciation of life itself. I am not speaking about "how much" or "how many." What we receive from our lives is not something that can be calculated in terms of money or placed on a scale and weighed. It is not relative as well and cannot be compared or measured to what others have. It is something of our very own and only we ourselves can understand and share it. We polish this understanding and appreciation in the dojo and in our Aikido practice. In Aikido, we are always trying to understand and harmonize with the other person. O-Sensei referred to Aikido as "misogi-waza" or the "method of self-purification." In such a difficult and complicated world we have created for ourselves, this is one thing I hope we shall never forget and preserve in our Aikido practice.
